The Importance of Citing Sources



Citing sources is crucial because it gives proper credit to the authors of ideas or information you use in your work, allowing readers to find the original source easily, and preventing plagiarism by clearly indicating where you obtained your information.

Plagiarism

Using someone else's ideas or work as your own without proper credit.

- Copying: Using a passage without quotation marks or citations.
- Paraphrasing: Rewriting ideas without citing the source.
- Presenting as Your Own: Claiming someone else's work or ideas, with or without their consent.

Popular Citation Styles

- APA (American Psychological Association): Commonly used in social sciences, psychology, education, and business.
- MLA (Modern Language Association): Commonly used in humanities, especially literature, arts, and cultural studies.
- Chicago Style: used for papers in the humanities, particularly in fields like history, literature, and art.
