

It has been another busy semester for the WGST program as we've worked behind the scenes to strengthen our minors and graduate degree. This semester we learned that the Women's and Gender Studies Program will be folded into a new school that will officially open in the fall. While details of this new venture are still being finalized (such as an official name), I am happy to share that I will be leading this new unit and am excited to see what sorts of new opportunities this presents for us.

Certainly, structural changes like this, especially in a social and political climate that are so unpredictable and challenging can create concerns and anxiety. I certainly feel this. It is no secret that we are in a moment that is especially unwelcoming to gender and sexuality studies, with a host of legislation designed to curtail our research and teaching or eliminate our programs. To respond to these challenges we must be creative and collaborative; strengths I know our faculty members, affiliates, and students are exceptionally capable of. My confidence and excitement about what comes next are grounded in the quality and strength of the interdisciplinary relationships we've been forging for years. Two particular places where we have fostered these ties have been in our recent Confluence: Interdisciplinary Explorations series, and in our annual Women's and Gender Studies symposium. Both of these events provide opportunities to foster and promote interdisciplinary scholarship, engage critical conversations, and showcase the innovative teaching and research of our affiliated faculty and students. Your enthusiasm and support for this programming always excites me and I look forward to carrying these efforts forward and to sharing more about the changes on the horizon as things become concretized. In the meantime, I am happy to share some other program updates and news.

As the spring semester concludes, we are excited to see three of our graduate students complete their M.A. degrees in Women's and Gender Studies; Courtney Bellamy, Ghazaleh Ebnenasir, and Maria Mazvimavi. Each of these three students have been vibrant members of our WGST community, serving as Teaching Assistants, mentors for our undergraduate students, and exceptional role models. They have tutored students in our WGST library, presented their work at conferences, and developed exceptional culminating research projects that have positioned them competitively for the future as they embark on PhD journeys, other educational paths, and/or the workforce. It is always sad to say goodbye to our students, especially because we form such meaningful relationships with them during their time here, but it is made a bit easier knowing that the opportunities for professional mentorship and friendship will only continue to grow. For the fall, we have already admitted five new graduate students and we will be excited to include them in our fall semester "Welcome Back Happy Hour" at Harvest House, as well as in ongoing coffee hours so they can meet some of our exceptional affiliated faculty across campus.

Also, after a very enthusiastic reception, we will continue to run our Confluence: Interdisciplinary Explorations Series. #### CONFERENCE: FROM DR. ÖZLEM ALTIOK:

"I attended the 69th meeting of the UN Commission on the Status of Women (CSW69) in New York in March 2025. CSW69 corresponded to the 30th anniversary of the Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing, China (1995), which was a historic event. I believe that attending the CSW on the occasion of Beijing Conference's 30th anniversary, in the midst of an escalating backlash against women's rights and gender equality, was also of historic significance... As a member of the International Committee and delegate of Sociologists for Women in Society (SWS), I presented at a panel that brought together sociologists from different parts of the world to interrogate different kinds of social and gender inequalities. The focus of my talk was Women and Armed Conflict 30 years after Beijing, specifically the (lack of) progress made in the area of women's participation in decision making in foreign policymaking and peacebuilding -- and demilitarization, more broadly. My work was published as part of the shadow report written for the US Women's Caucus at the United Nations. Wearing my hat as a delegate and scholar, among others, I attended many engaging CSW69 events hosted by a variety of different groups from conservative think tanks, UN agencies, and the European Union, among others.

While in New York, I made a point of watching Six on Broadway and the play Liberation because we also need art and fun things in our lives!"

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## women's and gender studies RESEARCH SYNPOSIUM & RECOGNITION CEREMONY

In April of 2025, we held our third research conference led by Dr. Katherine Ritter and Dr. Özlem Altıok. Students presented the exciting research projects they have developed across WGST courses. We hosted another poster session as well as panel presentations. The showcase of some of this critical work offered an opportunity for students to talk with affiliate faculty and with each other about the importance of interdisciplinary scholarship and ideas. We appreciate all in attendance who listened, learned, and engaged in dynamic conversations with our students about their work!

#### PANEL 1, DR. KATHERINE RITTER- FLESHINESS, SUBALTERNITY, AND CONSUMING THE DIGITAL OTHER:

Undergraduate students Berkeley Robinson, Leonardo Vargas, Ryann Ragsdale, and Mar Lamberson, as well as graduate student Abid Iskander, presented their thought-provoking and wide-spanning work in this compelling panel session. Topics in this evocative session included queering digital precarity, recasting representations of pyro-eroticism in media and culture, trans corporeality in literary representations of the more-than-human, feminist recastings of cannibalism and consumption, and a revisiting of "Can the Subaltern Speak" by Gayatri Chakravorty Spivak.

#### PANEL 2, DR. ÖZLEM ALTIOK-THE POLITICS OF GENDER AND SUSTAINABILITY IN THE AGE OF AUTHORITARIAN NEOLIBERALISM:

Students taking Gender & Sustainable Development seminar with Dr. Altiok this semester presented their research as part of the panel titled "The Politics of Gender and Sustainability in the Age of Authoritarian Neoliberalism," and participated in the poster session. Students' work ranged from Rose Bhaskar's "Sex Work and the City" focusing on gentrification in Mumbai, Kinza Aliza's "Health-seeking behavior of displaced Afghan women in Pakistan," Isabella White's "Trad-wives" and the representations of gender, class and sustainability in the neo-homesteading movement in the U.S.," and Valerie Gonzalez's "Blockchains or the chains of slavery in the fashion industry" that explored a new technology. Paige Trevino's research on the role of Rockefeller women in the creation of the National Parks Service was highlighted in the poster session."

The Dr. Marilyn Morris Award is awarded annually to a faculty member who has made outstanding contributions to the LGBTQ Studies Program at UNT. Award recipients represent the vanguard in creating innovative pedagogical and research strategies, fostering gender and sexuality as an analytical lens, and creating safe spaces for our students in the classroom. The award is named after its first recipient, Dr. Marilyn Morris, founder of the LGBT Studies Program in 2009, and a pioneer in scholarship on sexuality as interdisciplinary inquiry at UNT. 
